



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS UNDER SB4

WHEN QUESTIONED ABOUT YOUR IMMIGRATION STATUS BY LOCAL OR STATE POLICE

- You do not have to answer any questions about your immigration status, including:
 - Where you were born, how you entered the U.S.
 - If you are a citizen or if you have lawful status or "papers."
- You have the right to remain silent. Say clearly, "I wish to remain silent and I do not wish to answer any questions about my status."
- If you are stopped in your car:
 - If you are the driver of the vehicle, you should provide your driver's license, proof of insurance, and registration to the requesting officer if you have them.
 - Neither the driver nor passengers need to answer questions about anyone's immigration status.
 - If you are a passenger, you can ask if you are free to leave. If yes, silently leave.
 - You do not need to provide foreign identification.
 - Never lie or provide false documents.
- If you are arrested:
 - You must give your name, residence address, and date of birth only.
 - You do not have to answer any other questions. Say clearly, "I wish to remain silent"
- When in doubt, do not answer any questions about your immigration status.
